Looking Towards Sunday

"Loaves & fish for 5,000. Stories of feeding of multitudes in the wilderness pose multiple problems for the critical reader and scholar."

That quote is from the book <u>The Acts of Jesus</u> by Robert W. Funk and the Jesus Seminar. The book is subtitled: What Did Jesus Really Do? Funk and the seventy-nine Fellows of the Seminar (a group of biblical experts) conducted an elaborate search for the authentic deeds of Jesus. I occasionally consult their findings when I'm preparing to preach because it's truly difficult to discern the truth of a text.



Sunday's conversation is concerned with a miracle story that you may have heard. It's the one about Jesus and the disciples feeding five thousand souls in a deserted place with five loaves and two fish (Mark 6:30-46). The experts theorize that the gospel describes a hypothetical event – they say that it presents too many problems for it to be plausible. Can you believe that?! I mean, I'm actually asking what you think Jesus actually did. I'll say more when I see you. The sermon is entitled: **Problem(s) Shared. Problem(s) Solved.**

On August 18 at 9 a.m. Molly Bohman will be leading a discussion of Pedro Martin's <u>Mexikid</u>, an unforgettable graphic memoir about a Mexican American boy's family and their adventure-filled road trip to bring their abuelito back from Mexico. "Pedro has grown up hearing stories about his abuelito -- his legendary crimefighting, grandfather who was once a part of the Mexican Revolution!
